So pick one up, get outside, and enjoy yourself!










Ota City's Draft Budget for Fiscal Year 2023

Ota City has finalized its draft budget for FY2023. Access Ota City's website through the 2D code to learn about the basic thinking behind next year's budget.








Part 2 Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region, China

Ota City is a Great Place to Work!

In this edition of Ota City Navigation, we introduce a foreign national who works in Ota City to help non-Japanese readers learn about what makes working in our city worthwhile. In part two of this series, we present Ms. Wugedelehu from China's Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region. Known for her bright personality, Ms. Wugedelehu is responsible for training new employees in the convenience store industry, where the number of non-Japanese workers is increasing.

Why did you come to Japan?

I arrived in Japan in October 2018. I worked as a kindergarten teacher in Inner Mongolia for a year after graduating from university, but I wanted to try something new. I was always hearing about Japan from my university professors. So, I wanted to see Japan for myself someday. And that's why I chose to come.



Tell us about your current job and why you decided to do it.

I work for a company that is contracted to provide human resources training. I am in charge of training new convenience store employees, not just non-Japanese. I chose the job because I wanted to be involved in human resource development. I first became interested in that kind of work when my manager suggested I take crew leader training at my first part-time job. That experience made me realize that I enjoy training new employees.



I also wanted to show the same warmth to others that my manager showed me. Back then, I couldn't speak Japanese very well and made mistakes because I was nervous. But my manager taught me patiently and with kindness. I still remember that. So when I train new employees, I try to treat them with the same patience and warmth.

And I try to do more than teach them the job. I also want them to be conscious of enjoying working with others. So I make it a point to be sure that I also enjoy my work.





Thank you, Ms. Wugedelehu. We are sure your warmth and cheerfulness will spread from convenience stores to our community.
